ACTIVITIES

Active Listening

- Beginning stages of community engagement is connecting human to human individually
- Active Listening
 - when one person speaks the other does not speak or respond but listens and takes in information. You can physically show you're listening by nodding your head and/or eye to eye contact
- Pair up!
 - 1 person speaks for 2 mins, the other listens
 - The listener repeats what stood out for 1 min (Switch)

WHAT IS COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT?

Talk to people like they're human

- Communicate with authenticity and sincerity
- Demonstrate empathy and understanding towards others
- Treat others with respect & dignity
- Listen actively—value what others have to say
- Encourage open and two-way communication



What is community engagement?

- Using clear and plain language to avoid confusion
- Creating a friendly and approachable atmosphere
- Being mindful of tone and emotions conveyed in communication
- Adapting communication style to suit individual preferences



What is community engagement?

- Building meaningful connections and fostering trust
- Respecting and valuing diversity in communication
- Taking accountability for mistakes and showing willingness to learn and improve



Understanding Community

- Participate in community events and activities to immerse yourself in the local culture and understand community values
- Learn the history and cultural heritage of the community to comprehend its traditions and identity

The city purchased the 17-acre Bertram-Huppertz farm sometime between 1875 and 1929. The parcel included what are now the Boggy Creek greenbelt and Rosewood Park. Lifelong resident Willie Simmons remembers raiding peach and plum trees along Nile Street and playing Boggy Creek in his youth, when the area was still quite rural. The greenbelt remains a defining feature of Rosewood, paralleling Boggy Creek from northeast to southwest through the neighborhood. This is a portion of the trail in the greenbelt.

Austin Parks Foundation's EastLink Trail

EastLink is a 5.1 mile urban trail in Central East Austin, connecting Bartholomew Park to Lady Bird Lake and other civic assets in between

 Commissioned six artists to create murals on pillars along Rosewood Avenue, reflecting the history and future of East Austin's community as told by the trail





 Traditional and non-traditional methods, meetings, activations, and events were used to reach community members with diverse perspectives

Trail Activations

 Two community lead trail tours, one on activism and the other on environment to help connect the community to EastLink in meaningful ways

Call for Artists

- The project encouraged applications from artists, designers, and creatives with lived experience in Austin
- Specifically seeking participation from traditionally non white communities
 - o Black, Chicano, Hispanic, Latino, Asian American, Indigenous

Inclusive Collaboration

- Artists Rejina Thomas, Ruben Esquivel, and Taylor Davis, were selected and share an understanding of underrepresented communities in Austin
- They collaborated with environmental artist Stacy Levy and Public City to create the floating wetland



Community Workshop

 An immersive workshop engaged the community and selected creatives to explore themes of cultural preservation, environmental activism, and climate change, guided by local and national experts





- Community Creation & Celebration: The community was invited to celebrate and assist in fabricating the designed floating wetlands, fostering a sense of ownership and engagement in the project
- Partners: Community Ceremony, Art Spark, Future Front, Juiceland
- **Community Partnerships:** The project is a collaboration with various organizations, including:
 - Watershed Protection Department's Shoreline Stewardship Program
 - Austin Parks and Recreation
 - Austin Art in Public Places
 - Several foundations and sponsors
